A large finished quilt worth 8 points must be at least LxW=120". Please keep this in mind because it makes it fair for everyone. Every quilter knows how to make a quilt larger...borders, borders, borders. Sometimes it only takes an additional inch or two.

#### LOVE THY BABY... need to get your Volunteer hours done?

Would you consider doing some small quilts and or Receiving blanks for us?

Love Thy Baby provides all the fabric so if your stash is short and you want volunteer hours please consider doing blankets for us.

We provide all the fabric needed all you have to do is surge or a rolled hem on the  $36 \times 36$  flannel. Small quilts  $36 \times 36$  are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch or meandering.

\*Small quilts are 1 for 1 Point

\*Surging or rolled hem on the receiving blankets 10 for 2 Points

\*Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

Please remember to bring all your Receiving Blankets, small quilts and hats back to our next meeting. Please make sure you return them in the white bag that you took them in along with the tag on the bag

## Defenders of Freedom 2018

The day started off with rain. I was hoping it would clear up and eventually it did. My hubster and I went over to Joe and Teresa's house with all 27 quilts. We got there early to help them clear up all the water off the furniture and set up the outside areas. Joe had his fans going full tilt and yard blower everywhere trying to dry off all the concrete and Teresa and I started wiping down the chairs and tables. Other guys were prepping the pulled pork, brisket, sausages and chickens. All of this had been cooking overnight in the smoker. Some other volunteers arrived later with coleslaw and potato salad. Humperdinck's donated 5 types of draft beer and ran the bar portion. Another one from there helped with carving the brisket when it was time to eat.

The bus arrived around 4 and it was full of happy veterans. This year we had 2 service dogs with their owners and what beautiful sweet animals they were. So attentive to their men. We had some wives with their husbands. I got to sign everyone in and made sure only those who had never received a QOV got a ticket for the drawing. I was determined to make sure all the WWII vets have gotten a quilt. I also was able to award a Korean vet a quilt and it was a lady!! I made a point of calling the Viet Nam vets up who come every year and gave them a guilt also. There was 5 of them. The rest were all given away with the raffle type drawing and was that ever fun. Once they saw the quilts, there was real emotion about claiming that guilt and they carried them around. One man said he was going to give it to his daughter for what she had to go through when he was injured. I told him it was his guilt to do what he wanted with. He gave me a hug and later I saw her with it. My best moment was when one veteran and his wife came in a wheelchair and had a service dog. It was his first time to Joe's house, so I showed him around and they settled in just before lunch was served. Later his number was called, and he got a quilt! Everyone clapped for him as he wheeled his chair up to get it. I have lots of pictures of the guilt awards and just pictures of the guys and families getting to connect with each other and talking. If you can get to my Facebook page, there are pictures from when they arrived and the golf tournament they went on the next day. Those pictures are from the Defenders organization.

All the guys asked me to tell you ladies how much they appreciated the quilts and thank you for making them. They are very humble guys and you always hear them say someone else deserves it more. But they were so excited when their number was drawn. I keep telling myself it's too much work and expense and then I see this and know I won't ever stop no matter what. It's like when you go to Scottish Rites and see the kids with their quilts but it's men and women who served our country. You just want to hug them all and do everything you can to show your appreciation.

So, keep them in your mind and hearts for next year. There will be new guys coming each year who would love to be honored with your quilts. It's a gift they never expect.

**Officer's Meetings** 

The Officers and Committee Members meet the second Thursday of each month at Oakview Baptist Church (north entrance) at 1004 South Story Road, Irving. We meet at 6:00 and everyone is welcome.

#### Here are 8 tips for writing on fabric:

1. Choose a smooth-surface, 100%-cotton fabric. **Permanent ink pens** perform better on all-cotton fabrics than on blends.

2. Select fabric in a color that allows the ink to show. Avoid white-on-white prints because the pattern is painted on the fabric rather than dyed into it.

3. Prewash your fabric (cotton fabrics usually contain sizing, which acts as a barrier to ink penetration).

4. Purchase pens that have permanent ink and are made for use on fabric. A fine point (size 01, .25 millimeter) writes delicately and is less likely to bleed as it writes. Lines can be made thicker by going over them more than once. For larger letters or numbers, **a size 05** (.45 millimeter) pen works well.

5. Test the pen on a fabric sample, then follow the manufacturer's directions for setting the ink. Wait 24 hours for the ink to set, then wash the sample as you would the quilt. The extra time it takes to run such a test will pay off in years of durability.

6. If you don't care to use your handwriting or just want to ensure nicely spaced letters, type your words using computer software. Adjust the size and spacing to fit your label size; space out letters a little more than normal to allow for the width of the marker tip. Print out the words onto paper and trace.

7. Practice on fabric scraps first. Write slowly and with a lighter touch than you would normally use when writing on paper. This allows time for the ink to flow into the fabric and lets you control the letters.

8. Stabilize the fabric and create guidelines for words with freezer paper. To do so, cut a piece of freezer paper bigger than the label. Use a ruler and a thick black marker to draw evenly spaced lines on the freezer paper's dull side. Press the shiny side of the freezer paper to the fabric's wrong side with a hot dry iron. After marking on the fabric, peel off the freezer-paper guide.

## **Dues Information**

The Guild's annual dues are due at the November meeting for the following year. All members are required to wear their current membership card as their name badge. A 50¢ fine is charged if not worn at the meeting.
