Quilting Trivia

According to dictionary.com the word "quilt" dates back to around 1250. The term in Middle English was "quilte", based on old French word cuilte derived from the Latin word "culcita" for mattress.

Quilting can date back to 3400 BC. The oldest quilt still around today is "The Tristan Quilt" dated around 1360 -1400.

World's largest quilt is the Aids Memorial quilt and weighs approximately 54 tons.

The first rotary cutter was invented in 1979 by Olfa for garment making, but soon quilters realized the wonderful advantages to it.

A 2014 study showed that quilting in the United States is a \$3.7 billion industry.

In Canada there is one national quilt organization that was founded in 1981. The Canadian Quilters' Association has 20,000 members and holds an annual conference each year that includes their National Juried Show.

The Dresden Plate quilt block was the most popular block in the 1920s and 1930s. Although when first published in the early 20s, it had different names like Grandmother's Sunburst, Dahlia and Sunflower.

The first spools for thread were invented in the 1820s and used birch wood.

*Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

CROCK POT TACO SOUP

RECIPE FROM FOOD.COM BY LUBIE INGREDIENTS SERVINGS 8 - 10

- 1(16 ounce) can pinto beans
- 1(16 ounce) can white beans or 1 (16 ounce) can kidney beans
- 1(11 ounce) canniblet corn
- 1(11 ounce) can Rotel tomatoes & chilies
- 1(28 ounce) can diced tomatoes
- 1(4 ounce) can diced green chilies
- 1(1 1/4 ounce) envelope taco seasoning mix
- 1(1 ounce) envelope Hidden Valley® Original Ranch® Dressing and Seasoning Mix 1lb shredded chicken, ground beef or 1 lb. any meat

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Cook meat and drain.
- 2. Shred if needed.
- 3. Add all ingredients to crock pot.
- 4. DO NOT DRAIN CANS.
- 5. Stir.
- 6. Cook on high for 2 hours or low for 4 hours.
- 7. Keep on low until serving to keep hot.
- 8. Garnish with sour cream, shredded cheese, chopped green onions, or tortilla chips.

EXTEND THE LIFE OF YOUR CUTTING MAT

Cutting mats are a quilter's best friend. When you start your journey of quilting, your life will be made much easier by purchasing a self - healing mat to cut your fabrics on. These mats close up any incisions from rotary cutters leaving no visible slices on the mat. Self - healing mats have a certain limit to the amount of slicing they can take so if you start seeing cuts remain or need more pressure when using a rotary cutter, this may indicate your mat needs replacing. Cutting mats can last a long time and to ensure your mat serves you well, take care of it. You can extend the life of your cutting mat by following a few tips:

- Avoid harsh chemicals when cleaning your mat. Clean stains and dust by using a gentle soap and water combination and a lint free cloth.
- If you cut a fuzzy or linty fabric, such as minky fabric or loosely woven canvas, the extra fluff can sometimes get stuck in the cuts. In order for your mat to heal, the fuzz needs to be removed.

Tips and Tricks

To remove sizing from quilt backing, put fabric in the dryer with 3 fabric softener sheets for 60 minutes.

To prevent your folded quilt from wrinkling, fold with bubble wrap.

Always washes her finished quilts with "Resolve". Soak quilt in Resolve overnight then wash. Do not hang to dry. Partially dry, remove from dryer and let cool for at least 30 minutes before returning to the dryer. This prevents the batting from" clumping".

Batting has a "right & wrong" side (who knew???!!!). " Grit to the ground, cotton to the clouds".
