Slow Cooker Kielbasa Bites

Ingredients

- 2 to 3 lbs kielbasa
- 12 oz jar chili sauce
- 1 cup barbecue Sauce (use Your favorite!)
- 1 cup grape jelly
- 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 11/2 tsp garlic powder
- 11/2 tsp onion Powder

Directions:

- 1. Spray slow Cooker with Cooking spray.
- 2. Cut kielbasa Into bite Size pieces
 And place in the prepared slow cooker.
- 3. Combine Chili sauce, Barbecue sauce, grape jelly, Worcestershire sauce, garlic powder, and onion powder in a bowl and whisk to combine.
- 4. Pour over kielbasa.
- 5. Cover And cook on low for 4 to 6 hours or high for 2 to 3 hours or until kielbasa bites are heated through.

Served as an appetizer or with rice for dinner.



The Aloha Quilt

(Book 16 in the Elm Creek Quilts series)

A novel by Jennifer Chiaverini

Another season of Elm Creek Quilt Camp has come to a close, and Bonnie Markham faces a bleak and lonely winter ahead, with her quilt shop out of business and her divorce looming. A welcome escape comes when Claire, a beloved college friend, unexpectedly invites her to Maui to help launch an exciting new business: a quilter's retreat set at a bed and breakfast amid the vibrant colors and balmy breezes of the Hawaiian Islands. Soon Bonnie finds herself looking out on sparkling waters and banyan trees, planning quilting courses, and learning the history and intricacies of Hawaiian quilting, all the while helping Claire run the inn.

As Bonnie's adventure unfolds, it quickly becomes clear that Claire's new business isn't the only excitement in store for her. Her cheating, soon-to-be ex-husband decides he wants her stake in Elm Creek Quilts, which threatens not only her financial well-being but her dearest friendships as well. Luckily she has the artistic challenge of creating her own unique Hawaiian quilt pattern to distract her - and new friends like Hinano Paoa, owner of the Nä Mele Hawai'-i Music Shop, who introduces Bonnie to the fascinating traditions of Hawaiian culture and reminds her that love can be found when and where you least expect it.

Tips from a Longarm Quilter (ask your Longarmer for their preference):

- Your backing and batting should be at least 3" larger on each side than your quilt top. Example, your quilt top measures 60" x 80" therefore your backing and batting should each measure 66" x 86". If quilt is a king size, then use 4" larger on each side. Consult with your Longarmer for their preference.
- Do you piece your batting for your Longarmer? If the batting has been "needle punched" then it has a right and a wrong side for a Longarmer. The right side will have more indentations or "dimples" where the manufacturer's needle-punching machine pressed the fibers together. Bottom line, if you are piecing your batting to give to your Longarmer, make sure the "dimples" are facing up (or down) when sewing it together.

We provide all the fabric needed all you have to do is surge or a rolled hem on the 36×36 flannel. Small quilts 36×36 are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch or meandering.

- *Small quilts are 1 for 1 Point
- *Surging or rolled hem on the receiving blankets 10 for 2 Points
- *Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

Please remember to bring all your Receiving Blankets, small quilts and hats back to our next meeting. Please make sure you return them in the white bag that you took them in along with the tag on the bag

2019 Mystery Quilt Challenge – March

Irving Quilt Guild by Susan Turk

Unit 4 (label and put in ziplock bag)


Instructions given for Lap Size. Twin Size will be in parenthesis.

Summary:

Make 24 (48) rectangle snowballs using fabric 2 & 3. Unfinished size should be 2 ½" X 6 ½"


Detail Instructions:

- Fabric 3 Cut 24 (48) 2 ½" X 6 ½"
- Fabric 2 Cut 48 (<mark>96</mark>) 2 ½" X 2 ½"
- Mark a diagonal line on wrong side of the 2½" squares
- Arrange two 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares align with each 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle (see diagram), right sides together. Sew on the lines drawn.



- You have three options for the excess fabric from the Snowball:
 - Leave it alone
 - o Cut off the excess and either keep or trash it.
 - \circ Sew a line $\frac{1}{2}$ " away from the previous sewn line toward the outside. Cut in between the sewn lines and keep the small triangle for a mini quilt or another project.
- Press Rectangle shape and should measure 2 ½" X 6 ½".

It should look like this:
