*Small quilts are 1 for 1 Point

*Surging or rolled hem on the receiving blankets 10 for 2 Points

*Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

Quilt Show Meeting Notes

Quilt turn in times are 12:00 to 4:00 on Monday August 19th. I will be glad to take anyone's quilt who can't make those times for turn in. You can bring your quilt to the Guild meeting on August 15th. If you have signed up to work the check in tables then you need to arrive at Arlington Convention center no later than 11:30.

Ticket sales: this is a HUGE source of income for us. As in the previous years we get so many tickets for free so all the money earned is completely ours and the other tickets only cost us 5.00 each so we make 5.00 for each of those sold. Get them for you friends and family at the discounted price. It is very important that we sell these tickets in order to make any money for the guild.

Miniature quilts: They have way too many...so there will be some that get passed back to the Guild Booths to sell there...especially if they go up for auction and don't sell at that time. They are going to stress Buy it Now prices so don't be surprised if they are priced lower than previous years. We don't really have that many entered so not sure if this will affect us or not.

There are 47 entries in the Junior division. That is pretty good but these will be displayed in a special area and not with our quilts. But it's a great start in getting the youngsters in to sewing.

We are all uncertain just exactly how well this show will run with the gaming part being open in front of the ballroom where the quilts will be and the food area will be in the back of the exhibit hall by the stage. The stage was moved from the front of the exhibit hall to the back corner also. But at least all the quilts will be in one room except for the mini- auction. I think and of course and all are hoping that the move to Irving Convention will be a better deal for traffic and attendance. They are discussing trying to work with Plano Guild as this new weekend date is the same weekend as their show. We talked of trying to get out of town guilds to organize bus trips to the area to go to our show and also the Plano show on the same trip. Hopefully they will be open to trying this combined advertising. Hoffman is open to working with them on this also as far as pushing the 2-shows / one area type deal. We will see what comes of it.

So now we are neck deep in last minute details but it's all good. Excitement is starting to build. If you think you might want to get involved on the Board positions then let me or Susan Holt know. We will sure let you get involved.
