We provide all the fabric needed all you have to do is surge or a rolled hem on the 36 x 36 flannel. Small quilts 36 x 36 are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch or meandering.

*Small quilts are 1 for 1 Point

*Surging or rolled hem on the receiving blankets 10 for 2 Points

*Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

Please remember to bring all your Receiving Blankets, small quilts and hats back to our next meeting. Please make sure you return them in the white bag that you took them in along with the tag on the bag

The Irving Quilt Guild will be collecting gifts for Irving children at the meeting on Thursday, November 21st. NEW <u>unwrapped</u> gifts, canned food or cash are needed. We will have firefighters from the Irving Fire Department attending our meeting. The following list includes the most needed items. At the Guild meeting I asked you to include **feminine hygiene products** (pads, tampons, hygiene wipes) when you shop for Blue Christmas. Like canned food, this is a necessary and vital commodity, but pricey for families who are struggling. LaCora suggested that you might want to include small zipper bags for a teen girl to carry her supplies in.

- *Books for teens, both boys and girls
- *Bicycle helmets for children 12 and under.
- *Art supplies for all ages, but especially for older children and teens.
- *Games and puzzles for older children and teens.
- *Cash, or checks made out to Blue Christmas, will help to buy the food given to the families. Gift cards are <u>not</u> accepted.
- *Canned food, especially protein like tuna, spam, chili, and other non-perishable food items.

Stuffed animals or other plush toys are not needed at this time.

2020 Retreat

We will have two Guild retreats for 2020, the Spring at Compass Centre March 5-8 and the Fall at a new location called Red Boot Retreat October 22-25. I will start collecting money for the Spring Retreat in December. If there are any food allergies, please let me know.

The fall retreat will be at a new location called Red Boot Retreat. It is located North/West of Hillsboro. There is a max of 32 and minimum of 24 required. The bedrooms range from 2, 3 or 4 beds and there are 6 full baths and 2 half bathrooms. There will be a massage therapist if you want one. The workstation has 2 tables with adjustable legs and are the hard tops (not plastic) where your machine will not bounce when you sew. Your station also includes a cutting mat and a high-powered lamp with a dimmer. Centralized iron stations will be available. The eating area is next to the sewing area where Tea and Coffee are available. The local quilt shops are located in Whitney. This venue requires a deposit and money ahead of time, so payment must be made to the guild or you will not be able to attend, no exceptions.

Alabama Pecanbread

Ingredients

- 2 cups pecans, finely chopped
- 1 ½ cups self-rising flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 4 large eggs, beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preparation

Preheat oven to 350° F and lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish with butter or non-stick spray.

In a large bowl, use a wooden spoon to stir together sugars (white and brown) eggs and oil until fully incorporated.

Stir in flour and salt until incorporated, then mix in vanilla and fold in pecans.

Pour batter into greased baking dish, then place in oven and bake for 45-60 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out mostly clean.

Remove dish from oven and let cool at least 15 minutes before slicing and serving.




Unit 3 (qty 4)




