Mother's Day

The official holiday in the United States, however, began with a lady named Ann Jarvis in 1868. Ann tried to establish a Mother's Friendship Day after the Civil War. She wasn't successful during her lifetime, however her daughter Anna Marie Jarvis began to work on a Mother's Day holiday after Ann died.

In 1910 Anna Marie got the state of West Virginia to declare Mother's Day an official holiday. The rest of the nation soon followed and in 1914 it was declared a national holiday by President Woodrow Wilson. Since then Mother's Day has become one of the most popular holidays of the year

Show meeting update. April 2021

We are down to the wire believe it or not. May is almost here and June 1st deadline is just around the corner. We need you to enter your quilts online as soon as possible so they can see where we are. If you had a quilt entered before the 2020 show was canceled, then your information is still in the system. You should be getting an e- mail asking if that quilt is still available to be entered. Please respond to that e-mail as soon as you can. If you have another quilt you would like to enter that you might have completed during COVID shutdown then by all means enter it also.

Here are the highlights of the meeting:

 Quilt turn in will be on Sunday, August 15th from 1-5 pm. If you would like to help me on that day let me know. I will also need people for quilt check out on Saturday, August 21st after the show closes.
The web link is on the Irving Guild website to enter your quilts.

3. Ticket sales will be on- line. If you buy a ticket, be sure to pick a Guild to get the sale. We have 80 tickets that are no charge to us that we can sell and keep total profits. After those are sold we go to a 50/50 split with Quilt Expo. We need this revenue.

4. We need miniatures or maybe nice table runners that can fit on those dowels for display purposes. This will be a silent auction this year with about 60 quilts sold each day of the show. We need this revenue.

5. We are going to need volunteers and Ambassador's as usual. They are not quite ready to open that up for signing on but soon. Look at the classes offered and see if there is one you want to sit in on and help. Great way to learn for free.

6. There will be cash prizes this year for certain categories of quilt entries. They will be soliciting the venders to add to these with other prizes and sponsorships. They are trying to get Missouri Star to participate in this also.

7. T-Shirts will be available again. Same shirts but they have to re-design the year on the logo. They will come in Purple and Teal, so you get to pick your favorite color. They won't be more than \$15.00 but possibly less. Supposedly they will be for sale at the show but might cost more there or might not carry all sizes. As soon as I know more, I will get the word out and figure out a way to pay with no meetings happening.

If you are wondering why, I keep saying we need the revenue when we aren't having meetings let me explain. If you joined in the zoom meetings you might have seen some guest speakers. These people cost money...lots of money. We did not collect dues this year. We paid for 48-hour appreciation class items. We still have expenses to cover with no income. Sure...we have some reserve but that is what it's for...reserve. We worked hard selling raffle tickets and putting on quilt shows for years to get that reserve. We used to keep the free retreat money and add it to the Guild income instead of spending it on just the people who can attend the retreats. Any windfall we were able to gather went into our accounts. That is where that savings came from. Without the added income from the canceled show last year, we are probably getting a little tight in the checkbook. (I'm not sure about that but I'm guessing.) This is why we need your support for the quilt show. Ours is going to be the FIRST quilt show in over a year. We are beating Dallas and Houston. And Plano is having theirs after ours. We have a great opportunity to greet Fabric Starved Quilters and give them some much needed quilt comfort.

Our next show meeting will be May 17th so I should have more final information by then. If something important happens that needs immediate response, I will send out a blast to the membership.

We have a great opportunity to welcome everyone to Irving and make this a great show in a large bright space. This is our home court, and we need to show up and show off!!!

Thanks for all you do for the Guild and for the show. You ladies have always come through and I know you will again. I appreciate you all.

Love Thy Baby provides all the fabric so if your stash is short and you want volunteer hours please consider doing blankets for us.

We provide all the fabric needed all you have to do is surge or a rolled hem on the 36×36 flannel. Small quilts 36×36 are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch or meandering.

*Small quilts are 1 for 1 Point

*Surging or rolled hem on the receiving blankets 10 for 2 Points

*Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

Please remember to bring all your Receiving Blankets, small quilts and hats back to our next meeting. Please make sure you return them in the white bag that you took them in along with the tag on the bag

Carrabba's® Spicy Sausage Lentil Soup

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 cup minced onion

3/4 cup grated and minced carrot

1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 pound uncooked hot Italian sausage

2 ounces diced ham (about 1/2 cup, cut from a ham steak)

7 cups water

5 cups chicken broth

1 pound dry lentils

1 con Rotel tomators

1 medium tomato, diced 2 tablespoons vinegar

1 tablespoon minced fresh basil

1 tablespoon minced fresh parsley

1 1/2 teaspoons salt -> use only 1 J tesp 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme

1/2 teaspoon dried oregano

1/2 teaspoon dried red pepper flakes

1. Heat up olive oil in a Dutch oven or large saucepot over medium heat. Add onion, carrot, and garlic. Remove sausage from casing, and add it to the pan. Saute for 8 minutes, stirring often. Break up the sausage into bite-size bits as it cooks. Add ham, and cook for an additional minute.

2. Add the remaining ingredients to the pot, bring to a boil, then reduce

Simmer for one hour
