There are all sorts of quilting scissors on the market. Beginners need two types to get started. The first is a pair of lightweight fabric scissors that feel good when you hold them.

Use these to only cut fabric.

You'll also need a pair that can cut plastic, paper, and the other materials you need to cut to do the job.

Heritage rag quilt scissors are popular because your fingers rest outside the handles instead of being caught inside the handle holes.

We provide all the fabric needed all you have to do is surge or a rolled hem on the 36 x 36 flannel. Small quilts 36 x 36 are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch or meandering.

*Small quilts are 1 for 1 Point

*Surging or rolled hem on the receiving blankets 10 for 2 Points

*Hats, diaper shirts and booties are 10 for 2 Point

Caprese Bruschetta

This Caprese Bruschetta appetizer is so simple and elegant. The layers of bread, mozzarella, tomato, and basil stack up for one tasty morsel! Perfect for the vegetarian at your gathering. You can prepare the ingredients in advance, then assemble as guests arrive.

INGREDIENTS

 Italian baguette
pound fresh mozzarella
Roma tomatoes
basil leaves
to 3 cloves garlic, cut in half
to 3 tablespoons balsamic vinegar or balsamic glaze
salt and pepper, to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

Slice baguette on the diagonal into 24 slices — save ends for another use. Broil until lightly toasted. Rub each slice with garlic clove as soon as they come out of the oven. Cut mozzarella into 24 pieces, about ½ inch thick and sized to cover bread. Slice each tomato into 6 slices.

To assemble: place baguette slice on platter, top with mozzarella then tomato, salt and pepper to taste; then top with basil leaf and drizzle with balsamic vinegar.

Serve immediately.

YIELD:

Serves 8-12, makes 24 appetizers.

I wanted to very instantly send out this little bit of information to all of the members. We will discuss this some more at the meeting on Thursday, but deadlines are fast approaching, and we need to get things finalized in the next few weeks.

- T-shirts will cost 15.00 now or 20.00 at the show. I will be taking pre-orders at the meeting. Please bring CASH ONLY. The shirts are V-neck tees like the last ones we bought. You have your choice of either Teal or Purple with a Show theme logo that says, "Sing Your Song In Fabric". All pre-orders must be turned in by June 15th. If you cannot get to the meeting, then I will be glad to meet you at my home and take your order if you want. Otherwise, you can wait until the show. We are getting a small portion of the sales as income.
- 2. Entries- the last info I got was our quota is 33 quilts and we had 28 entered. We can certainly have more, but this is a great job from all of the members. I am so excited with the great response. June 1st is still the deadline for entries...or additional entries!!
- 3. Ticket Sales- These will be on-line, but we might have a few paper tickets for those who need them. I will be sending a "Guild Only" address for ordering these discounted tickets soon. Our sales are the source of income and you should utilize this 10.00 ticket to get your family and friends into the show. Please do not release this address to people outside of the guild as this is for our special priced tickets only.
- 4. Junior entries. There is only one entry so far. If you have grandkids, then you should encourage them to look up the categories and enter something. There are cash prizes set aside for the Junior category.



June 19 is **Juneteenth** (also known as **Freedom Day** or **Emancipation Day**). On this day in 1865, Union General Gordon Granger read the Emancipation Proclamation aloud in Galveston, Texas, effectively liberating slaves in the state, which had thus far been beyond control of the Union Army.

This year's picnic was hampered by guess what??? RAIN...something that we have seen like almost every day for weeks it seems but for a few hours it held off long enough for Joe and Teresa to blow dry off furniture and walkways, set the food serving line up inside the Man Cave instead of outside by the smoker and the band was cut down from 4 or 5 guys to just 2 on guitar. By the time the bus arrived at 4:30 and the people began to get off, all was ready. This year we had 22 new military in the group and 2 of them were women. The rest of the guys were from previous trips and they were showing the newbies the ropes. There was even a gentleman who was from the Iraq Army during Desert Storm. He volunteered to work with the Americans against Iran and worked on secret intel missions that helped save hundreds of lives over years. He now lives in the US with his mother and has married and settled in South Carolina. He told us that of his platoon of elite members there are only 3 left alive there. He thanked the guys for all they did during the war because it showed them, they had the skills to stand up to Iran and we gave them the knowledge and training to continue the struggle. He was a great speaker and for those from that war it was uplifting for them to hear from someone who lived the struggle.

It wasn't all seriousness though...the usual horseplay was going on along with all the banter. And of course, the food was a highlight. All of the returning men thanked me again for the quilts they received in years past and told me they have put them in places of honor in their homes. Some in the living rooms, some on their beds or next to their favorite chair. The new recipients were surprised and delighted with their gifts once we started the drawing. Pictures will be coming as soon as I can get them downloaded from the camera. As a matter of fact, Hamadi (the Iraqi vet) called his wife and gushed about his quilt and told her he couldn't wait to show her when he flies home! He was a sweet, sweet person who definitely appreciates his life in America and the opportunities he has here.

The first day of the gathering came to an end and they all boarded the bus back to the hotel to get some rest before the golf tournament on Monday and Joe got back to putting his backyard together again. So, until next year when we do it all again, I will say thank you ladies for all your efforts for these men and women who give so much. They truly do appreciate your gift and are very humble when they are handed their quilts.
