Date: September 16, 2021 Meeting called to order by Linda Scott at 7:00 pm

Minutes from August meeting were approved.



Linda Cole reported the guild realized approximately \$4600 income from the quilt show.

Carol Cook said thank you to all who participated in the show. Irving Quilt Guild had the most volunteers of all the guilds. Carol has been mentioned to be show chair next year. The next year's show will be at the Irving Convention Center.

Connie Angeles introduced guest Allison Dale. Welcome Allison.

Connie also gave Sunshine and Shadows news:

Former guild member Jody Rhea is in hospice; Mickie Ray has been moved to a rehab facility in Plano and has developed COVID; Ethel Ray continues good health and would welcome cards; Wanda Rolf is 93 and had aortic valve replacement this summer but has recovered well.

Susan Turk said we have 22 attendees to the retreat. Directions and room assignments are to come by email.

After discussion by the board, Angel Quilt point awards have been clarified. Points will still be dependent on the size of the quilt. Separate points will be awarded for piecer and quilter; however if the piecer also quilts the quilt, the piecer will be awarded both point values. These changes will be effective January 2022.

Voting was held for the Galla Award. The winner is Judy Poole!

Evelyn Banks reported that we will have a contingent of firemen to receive Blue Christmas items at our November meeting. Suzanna Fox moved that the guild donate \$250 to Blue Christmas. The motion was seconded and discussion took place. The motion was voted on and did not pass.

Donna Reid announced the winner of the light red challenge was won by Pansy Shehee. Pansy wins a \$20 gift certificate to be used for Angel Quilt quilting.

After Show & Tell and door prizes, the meeting was adjourned at 8:20 pm.

Fabric Starter Piece

also use a scrap piece of fabric at the beginning of every seam which helps to ensure the stitching starts smoothly, the little nest of thread that can happen on the bottom of the seam is now on the scrap and it prevents the needle from pushing a corner of fabric down into the bobbin area and causing a jam. I use the scrap piece over and over again until it's thread tales and stitching are too messy and then toss it and start another scrap piece. This little piece of fabric has eliminated much frustration and aids in much smoother and continuous stitching.

If you use blue water erasable pens for marking up designs on work, these vour marks can be easily and permanently removed by spraying them with a freshly made solution (1 cup of water and 1 heaped teaspoon of baking soda) and allowing to dry naturally.



Use chenille stems for cleaning your machine. They are very inexpensive and easy to find at craft stores. They can be bent or looped to fit into tiny, out of the way spaces. They collect the dust and lint and can be wiped off and reused. Also, if you trim them or keep folding them, you can use them multiple times.





FRITO PIE CASSEROLE

Ingredient's

- 1 pound Ground Beef
- 1 small Onion finely chopped
- 1 packet Taco Seasoning + water on packet
- 1 15 ounce can Kidney Beans drained and rinsed
- 1 cup Corn Kernels frozen is best
- 1 can 15oz Enchilada Sauce
- 1 10.25 oz bag Fritos
- 2 cups Sharp Shredded Cheddar Cheese
- Various toppings for serving:
- Green onions
- Lettuce
- Black olives
- Avocado
- Sour Cream

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350° F. Spread 3/4 of the bag of Fritos in the bottom of a 9×13 -inch baking dish.

In a large skillet brown ground beef and onion until fully cooked.

Mix in taco seasoning and water until well blended. Cook until thickened.

Add enchilada sauce, beans, and corn. Mix until everything is well combined.

Pour over Fritos and spread into an even layer. Sprinkle the cheese over the beef mixture.

Bake for 15-20 minutes until the cheese is melted and bubbly.

Serve topped with additional Fritos and your favorite taco toppings.
