Date: July 21, 2022 Meeting called to order at 6:55 p.m. by Alene Winn.

The meeting started with the July program, a surprise, featuring Mary Calloway, a Dallas quilter and member of the Quilters Guild of Dallas, who presented a delightful and interesting trunk show which was most of the meeting. She used her collected old quilts and those that she had made to illustrate different types of quilt blocks, materials, and colors as well as her experience with quilting. Each quilt had an interesting story behind it. She ended the presentation with a blanket made with a picture of Elvis on it to illustrate the different between a blanket and a quilt.

After a break, Sue Hyde and Thenia Haynie awarded door prizes because they had to leave early. Then, Alene conducted the business meeting. She started off by thanking Alison Dale for bringing free Moda fabric to the meeting. She also reminded everyone who has one of Alison's Moda panels to get their quilts made by the September meeting.

<u>Programs and workshops:</u> Bonnie reminded everyone about the "Christmas in July" workshop on Saturday, July 23rd, at Senter East, from 8 a.m. to 12 noon. There were samples on one of the tables of the projects that attendees would be working on,

<u>Quilt Show</u>: Carol Cook announced that she had the T-shirts for those people who had ordered them last month. Anyone wanting T-shirts can buy them at the Show for \$20. Quilt turn-in day is Sunday, August 14th, from 1-5 p.m. Carol recommended that everyone turning in a quilt, get there as soon as possible to avoid the long lines. More volunteers are needed for the non-Expo jobs—mini quilt auction, T-shirts, bag check. The Show now has 319 quilts for display.

Susan Holt also announced that there are a few volunteer holes, but she is certain that they will be filled by the time of the Show. She wanted everyone to know that the Guild is doing a fabulous job of volunteering.

Donna announced that set-up for the Guild's booth/store is Wednesday, August 17th, from 8:00-9:00 a.m. and take-down, Saturday, August 20^{th,} starting at 4:30 p.m. She needs help with both. Anyone who is making items for the booth should bring them to the August meeting, but she will be taking them right up to the Show.

Sue Gray announced that she is selling Show tickets for \$12 each. (The tickets are \$15 each at the door.)

<u>Retreat</u>: Sue Gray also announced that she is taking deposits or the full amount of the cost for the Fall retreat. It is October $13-16^{th}$ at Red Hat, for \$280 per person.

<u>Next month's meeting</u>: Alene reminded everyone that the August meeting will be held the second Thursday, **August** 11th, at 7 p.m. because of the Show. The board will be meeting the same day, one hour earlier, at 6 p.m. at the church.

<u>Sunshine and Shadows</u>: Alene announced that her sister, Charlene, had to go to the emergency room at Texas Harris Hospital because of pain in her legs. She ended up having to have the veins in her legs cleaned out. Hopefully, she will be able to go home Saturday. Jackie Wagner updated everyone on her son, Dale, who has started chemo for his cancer. He is keeping in good spirits and tests are showing that there is no cancer anywhere else in his body. She thanked everyone for their prayers.

<u>Angel Quilts</u>: Donna announced that anyone who had turned in an Angel quilt either last month or this month should make certain that they have turned in a light red slip. The slips will be part of a special drawing at this meeting for the baby quilt book that was donated last month by Christy Wilson. Donna conducted 2 drawings—one for these slips and one for the regular red slips awarding 4 points. Gail Webb won both drawings.

Donna also reminded everyone who took one of the panels with a Disney character, to either bring back a quilt made with the panel to the next meeting or the panel, itself, so that someone else can make a quilt.

Meeting called to order at 2:12 p.m. by Alene Winn, President.

Donna started off the meeting by announcing that Carol Cook got the Guild a booth for its store which is 10'x15' rather than just the usual 10×10 . She already has a lot of items for the booth but may need more. Please let her know if you have any more ideas. She will not be asking any members to volunteer to work in the booth. There will be 4 members staffing it—Susan Hyde, Thenia Haynie, Linda Cole and herself. She will provide the start-up money for it. They will need help setting up and tearing down the booth. Alene, Ernestine, and Sue Gray volunteered.

Treasurer, Jerry Bowen reminded the Board that she had sent all the board members a copy of the latest monthly statement earlier in the week. June's income was \$242 for the Show T-shirts. Expenses were the usual miscellaneous ones that the Guild has every month.

Update on the train quilt: Ernestine reported that the Archives Coordinator, Kevin Kendro, and the Museum's director, Jane are interested in meeting with Guild members about a special exhibit next year to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Guild. Sue Gray told everyone present that Helen Peele made the train quilt which is hand appliqued and hand quilted. The board members present approved moving forward with this. Ernestine will reach out to some of the founding members to see if they would like to be part of this meeting.

October Retreat: Sue Gray announced that she will start taking money for this retreat. The dates are October 13-16th at Red Boot Retreat for \$280. Eight to nine people have already committed to attending. She needs 20 to sign up. This is the week before the Guild's October general monthly meeting so some of the board members will not be at the board meeting on October 13th.

July meeting: Bonnie reported that there will be a program at the July meeting, but it will be a surprise for members. The speaker, Mary Calloway, will have to leave early so she will need to be the first item on the meeting's agenda. She lives on the other side of Dallas. Bonnie asked Jerry Bowen for a check for \$200 to pay her. She is meeting the speaker at 6 p.m.

New idea: Nancy reported that she had made a good test of some of the historical photos from selected years, at Threadpickers. She had brought 4 different years of Guild photos of quilts. She thinks that these photos will provide good ideas for quilts to give to Donna. All present agreed. She will be bringing the same scrapbooks to the July General meeting.





Easy Banana Pudding with Cream Cheese Recipe

10 ounces vanilla wafers	2 tea
4 bananas, sliced	8 ou
8 ounces cream cheese, room temperature	2 ¼

aspoons vanilla essence

inces cool whip or heavy cream, whipped

14 ounces sweetened condensed milk

cups of cold milk

5 ounces instant vanilla pudding

- 1. Whip the cream cheese and condensed milk together until silky smooth, scraping the bowl's sides for about 3 minutes on medium speed.
- 2. Put the vanilla, milk, and dry pudding mix in the bowl and start mixing at low speed for 30 seconds. Gradually increase the speed until you are on high speed. Mix for 5 minutes until the mixture is smooth and thick, scraping the bowl's sides as needed.
- 3. Fold half of the heavy whipped cream or cool whip into the easy banana pudding recipe with cool whip until integrated.
- 4. Line a large dish with as many vanilla wafers as you can fit. Uniformly place the banana slices on the top of wafers. Spread the pudding on the top of the bananas and then remaining heavy whipped cream or cool whip on the top of the pudding.
- 5. Cover and refrigerate for 3-4 hours. Crumble some vanilla wafers on the top of the pudding and serve to your loved ones.

Best Ever Beef And Barley Soup

Ingredients

- * 1 pound boneless chuck roast trimmed and cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 1 1/2 cups carrots thinly sliced
- * 1 1/2 cups celery thinly sliced
- * 2/3 cup onion chopped
- * 1 package pre-sliced mushrooms 8-ounce
- * 2 tbs beef base (this is different than beef broth it is a base that makes beef bro
- * 8-10 cups water
- * 1 large bay leaf
- * 1 cup uncooked pearl barley
- * 1/2 teaspoon salt
- * 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- * 1 tbs garlic

Instructions


1. Brown beef in non-stick fry pan until browned, stirring frequently.

2. Remove beef from pan and place in crockpot, Add carrot, celery, onion, and mushrooms, beef base,

water, garlic and bay leaf.

3. Cook on high heat for one hour, add pearl barley then turn down to low and cook till vegetables and beef are tender. Stir in salt and pepper.

4. Discard bay leaf.


