Date: August 11, 2022

Meeting called to order at 7:05 p.m. by Alene Winn.

Sunshine and Shadows: Alene announced that her sister, Charlene, is still in the hospital. Jerry Tollett broke her elbow and is in rehabilitation at Avanti. Her husband is in the hospital with Covid. Shawn Carr announced that Mickey Ray is now wheelchair bound and going to rehab.

Beginning Quilting Class: Cynthia Gladden confirmed the details for this class that she will be teaching, starting on Saturday, September 10, for 5 Saturdays, from 10 a.m. to Noon. Fundamental Baptist Church on 1119 Shady Grove Road will be the location for all 5 sessions. The Guild held its garage sale there last year. The cost will be \$20 for all 5 classes. Attendees will be making a versatile table runner. The maximum number of attendees will be 8. She will email anyone who signs up with more details on fabric requirements, etc. She provided some detail on what the curriculum will cover. There will be homework.

Programs and workshops: Bonnie Sloan announced that there will be no workshop in August. September's program will be Aine McCarthy from Dime, Texas. She will be making a presentation on the flip-and-sew technique. Aine will also be holding a workshop that Saturday, the 17th. She is taking sign-ups now for this workshop. It is \$5 per person which will be returned if, and only if, that person attends the workshop.

Quilt Show: Sue Gray announced that she still has the blue, pay-at-the-door tickets for anyone needing tickets/wanting to go to the Show. The Guild gets credit for ½ of the ticket receipts.

Susan Holt reminded everyone to watch for people who do not have a guild and offer them a Guild business card.

Donna Reid announced that set-up for the Guild's booth/store is Wednesday, August 17th, starting at 8:00 a.m. Take-down is Saturday, August 20th, starting at about 5:00 p.m. Come when you can. Anyone who is making items for the booth can give them to her tonight or leave them at the door of her house. She will also take them the day of the Show.

Carol Cook reminded everyone who has a quilt in the show, to bring it on Sunday, the 14th, from Noon to 4 p.m. Be sure to have a cover label on the quilt and be early. The lines get long. She also reminded all members who will be attending the show, to pick their favorite member quilt. The Gala Award for member favorite established by the Guild's founder, will be awarded at the September meeting.

Retreat: Sue Gray reported that she has 24 people signed up to attend the retreat at Red Boot in October. She asked that all sign-ups bring full payment with them to the next General Meeting, if they have not already paid.

Another Retreat Event: After the break, Susan Turk announced that Mona Livingston is running a retreat from September 22-25th at Red Boot. The cost is \$280. Only Guild members are allowed to attend. If interested, please contact Susan and she will pass your name onto Mona. Fourteen have signed up so far. Mona needs 20.

Panel Quilt Project: Alene Winn reminded everyone who took one of Allison Dale's panels to bring the quilt that they made from the panel to the September meeting. There will be prizes for the best quilts.

September meeting special announcement: Suzanna Fox announced that while she is out with shoulder surgery, Sue Gray will have the key to the church. Please enter the church through the covered walk. The other door is not working.

Show-and-Tell: Angel Quilts were shown after these announcements. Donna awarded the 4 Red ticket points to Jeanne Sullivan.

Susan Hyde and Thenia Haynie ended the meeting by awarding door prizes.

Alene adjourned the meeting at 8:05 pm.

The Board held a short board meeting before the August General Meeting, as planned, due to the Quilt Show being on the 18th, the third Thursday.

Meeting called to order at 5:56 p.m. by Alene Winn, President.

Quilt Show: Susan Holt started off the meeting by saying that everything is good with the Show. There are some early slots still open on Friday, but she is certain that someone will step up at the last moment to fill them. She asked the Board to be aware of anyone who is not in a guild and to hand them one of our business cards.

- **Donna Reid:** Everything is set for Wednesday at 8 a.m. to set up the Guild booth at the Show. Doors open by 8 a.m. There will be no parking fee for those volunteers helping out on Wednesday. She will need help to break down the booth, starting at 5 p.m. on Saturday. She has lots of stuff to sell but will accept any other items right up to the day of the Show. The Guild has one of the larger spaces.
- The **Board** unanimously agreed to pay parking for all Guild volunteers who have to be at the Show all 3 days. Parking is \$10 per day even if you are a volunteer.

Membership: Suzanna Fox announced that she will be having shoulder surgery soon. She needs the 2023 dates for Programs, Expo, and Retreats to get the directory to the printer before then. Evelyn Banks will staff the Sign-in Desk in her absence.

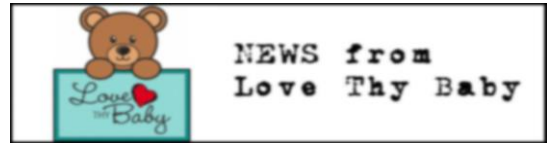

Misty's Book Nook



Stephen King

Historical Fiction/ Fantasy/Science Fiction

On November 22, 1963, three shots rang out in Dallas, President Kennedy died, and the world changed. What if you could change it back? Stephen King's heart-stoppingly dramatic new novel is about a man who travels back in time to prevent the JFK assassination—a thousand page tour de force.

Following his massively successful novel *Under the Dome*, King sweeps readers back in time to another moment—a real life moment—when everything went wrong: the JFK assassination. And he introduces readers to a character who has the power to change the course of history.

Jake Epping is a thirty-five-year-old high school English teacher in Lisbon Falls, Maine, who makes extra money teaching adults in the GED program. He receives an essay from one of the students—a gruesome, harrowing first person story about the night 50 years ago when Harry Dunning's father came home and killed his mother, his sister, and his brother with a hammer. Harry escaped with a smashed leg, as evidenced by his crooked walk.

Not much later, Jake's friend Al, who runs the local diner, divulges a secret: his storeroom is a portal to 1958. He enlists Jake on an insane—and insanely *possible*—mission to try to prevent the Kennedy assassination. So begins Jake's new life as George Amberson and his new world of Elvis and JFK, of big American cars and sock hops, of a troubled loner named Lee Harvey Oswald and a beautiful high school librarian named Sadie Dunhill, who becomes the love of Jake's life – a life that transgresses all the normal rules of time.

A tribute to a simpler era and a devastating exercise in escalating suspense, *11/22/63* is Stephen King at his epic best.

Disclaimer: this is NOT your typical Stephen King with the exception of length. Falls more in line with my all-time favorites *The Green mile* and *Shawshank redemption* as well as *stand by me*. All 3 based on his short stories or novels. It's violent in areas but not overly so. And if at some point in this you don't want a root beer float well 😊

Cracker Burrell hash brown casserole

- 32-ounce package frozen hash brown potatoes, thawed
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 10 3/4 ounce can cream of chicken soup
- 16-ounce container sour cream
- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 8-ounce package shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Preheat your oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Grease a 13-inch-by-9-inch baking pan. Place the hash brown potatoes in the baking pan and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Set aside. In a bowl, stir together the soup, sour cream, melted butter and onion. Spread the soup mixture over potatoes and stir gently. Sprinkle with the cheddar cheese. Bake uncovered for 45 to 55 minutes, until bubbly and golden.

Easy Banana Pudding with Cream Cheese Recipe

10 ounces vanilla wafers
4 bananas, sliced
8 ounces cream cheese, room temperature
2 ¼ cups of cold milk
2 teaspoons vanilla essence
8 ounces cool whip or heavy cream, whipped
14 ounces sweetened condensed milk
5 ounces instant vanilla pudding



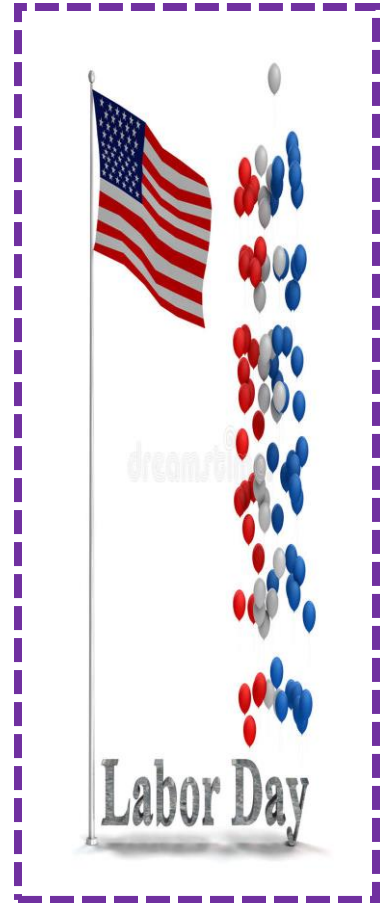
Whip the cream cheese and [condensed milk](#) together until silky smooth, scraping the bowl's sides for about 3 minutes on medium speed.

Put the vanilla, milk, and dry pudding mix in the bowl and start mixing at low speed for 30 seconds. Gradually increase the speed until you are on high speed. Mix for 5 minutes until the mixture is smooth and thick, scraping the bowl's sides as needed.

Fold half of the heavy whipped cream or cool whip into the easy banana pudding recipe with cool whip until integrated.

Line a large dish with as many vanilla wafers as you can fit. Uniformly place the banana slices on the top of wafers. Spread the [pudding on the top](#) of the bananas and then remaining heavy whipped cream or cool whip on the top of the pudding.

Cover and refrigerate for 3-4 hours. Crumble some vanilla wafers on the top of the pudding and serve to your loved ones.

You will learn:

- Setting up your sewing machine to sew ¼" seam
- Discussion of needles, threads and other tools
- How to care for your machine
- Pressing vs. ironing
- Diagonal seaming
- Attaching a border
- Sandwiching and basting your quilt
- Quilting the quilt (in the ditch)
- Binding the quilt
