Date: December 16, 2022

This meeting was the Christmas event for the Guild. There was no official meeting business done or Show & Tell, but there were some announcements made.

President Alene Winn announced at 6:30 p.m. that this meeting was a strictly social event and that everyone should go and enjoy the wonderful food that was on the back tables. Everyone agreed that there were some very tasty treats to enjoy.

Suzanna Fox told some funny quilting stories while the tables were cleared. The game of Left-Right-Center with fat quarters was played next which resulted in a lot of laughs and cheers. After that, the following announcements were made.

- *Donna Reid announced that she was using some of her 2022 budget money to give away some \$20 quilting gift certificates to anyone who made Angel Quilts during 2022. The winners' names were pulled from a bag. Winners will hand the certificate to the longarm quilter who will turn it over to the Treasurer for the winners to be paid.
- *Bonnie Sloan showed the finished quilt of the *Crazy Striped Star Quilt* pattern that will be made at the 48-Hour Workshop. She handed out instructions to all those members who earned 48 hours during 2022.
- *Susan Holt made 2 announcements regarding upcoming programs and workshops. The February program will be Annette Plog talking about reproduction quilts. Deborah Kay will conduct the workshop in February on Paper Piecing. Susan had a sign-up sheet for this workshop and several other upcoming workshops.
- *Shawn Carr announced that she will be in charge of the Guild store for the 2023 Quilt Show. She asked for some help in the form of a committee that would help her put the booth together and with ideas for different items to be sold. She suggested that each table elect a team leader to be on this committee.

The fun ended at 8:10 p.m.

IRVING QUILT GUILD – Board of Directors Meeting – December 8, 2022

Attending: Alene Winn, Sue Gray, Ernestine Chipman, Nancy Norris, Jerry Bowen, Susan Holt, Suzanna Fox, Donna Reed, Ginnie North, Gale Heneger, and Bonnie Sloan.

Absent: Judy Poole.

Meeting called to order at 2:03 p.m. by Alene Winn, President.

The attendees discussed 2 topics--the Proposed 2023 Budget and the results of the Programs/Workshops survey. Some additional suggestions for changes were also part of the discussions.

Proposed 2023 Budget: Attendees went through the proposed budget for 2023 fiscal year that the Guild Treasurer, Jerry Bowen, pulled together, line by line, and approved it with some changes, by the end of the meeting.

Income is projected to be \$23,050—a \$50 increase--to reflect an increase in the Family Fun Day Honorarium of \$250 (which Suzanna Fox says that the Irving Arts Center will pay the Guild for this Fun Day) and the increased income from the Guild retreats of \$250. The Income is not expected to increase more because there are fewer members now—projected dues income of \$1,950 vs. \$2,250 in 2022. Projected expenses will be \$28,235 due mostly to increased costs for Programs, Hospitality, 48-Hour Appreciation, Angel Quilt Committee, Membership Directory, Membership Supplies, the Newsletter, and the addition of the 25-year Commemoration Event, a separate line in the 2023 Budget at \$2,500. Suzanna Fox told the Board that the Membership Directory should be ready in February. Credit card and other transaction fees were added into the other Budget categories rather than as a separate Expenses line.

Jerry Bowen suggested that the Guild might need to have more fundraising events. It was also suggested that more mini quilts be made for the Quilt Show. The Guild made \$780 on them at the 2022 show.

Please contact Jerry Bowen if you have any questions. Please be advised that this is a budget which shows what the Board expects to gain as income and spend as expenses for this upcoming fiscal year.

Programs/Workshop Survey Results

Suzanna Fox presented the results of the Programs/Workshop Survey that she put on every table at the November General Meeting. Twenty-six members responded to the survey. Results for the following questions are:

- *How Important are Workshops: The majority of respondents felt that the workshops are important.
- *(Should be held) Weekday or Saturday: The majority of respondents preferred a weekday, but 8 of the respondents did not care.
- *What kind of Workshop: The top 4 responses were Embroidery, Barn Quilt, Paper Piecing, and Something We Can Finish.

Susan Holt told attendees that Deborah Kay will be doing 5 workshops for the Guild—one will be on Paper Piecing and one on Barn Quilts.

Related Suggestions: There were 4 made.

- *Committee Chairs should be given some type of recognition at the end of the year, maybe a gift.
- *Publicize the paid speakers more and/or charge non-Irving Guild members \$5 to attend the presentation.
- *Rows of chairs instead of tables for program presentations, especially the paid speakers.
- *An agenda should be created for each General Meeting and a copy of it placed on each table.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 p.m.


Patriotic Quilts for 2023

Angel Quilt Info

Thank you sooo much for turning in 267 Angel Quilts this year. Each quilt goes to a child at Scottish Rite. Sometimes it's to keep them warm sometimes it's a hug.

There are some of the panels we handed out not turned in yet. No problem at all. We'll look forward to see how you turned them into Angel Quilts.

At the December meeting the name of everyone who turned in an Angel Quilt in 2022 was in the drawing for a certificate worth \$20 for quilting an Angel Quilt. Ten were handed out. If you are one of the lucky ones to receive a certificate give it into your longarm quilter with your Angel Quilt. Quilters turn these to Jerry Bowen for payment.

Remember the small quilts are worth 4 points for piecing and 3 points to the quilter. If you do both you receive both. The size is a minimum of 90 inches. One length plus one width. The large quilt is worth 8 points for the piercer and 6 for the quilter. If you do both you earn both. The size is minimum 120".

The quilt must have the top, batting and backing. It must be quilted not tied. There cannot be any buttons or bows attached to the quilt because children receive them.

Always remember to write your name on the lite red paper.

Wash your hands. Clean hands are good for our fabric as well.

*Small quilts 36 x 36 are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch, meandering or x's.





FRIED CABBAGE

This stir-fried cabbage is delicious and easy to prepare using just a few ingredients.

Comes together in less than 30 minutes!

- °5-6 thick slices of bacon, cut into small pieces
- °1/3 cup finely chopped onion
- °1/2 head green cabbage, grated or coarsely chopped
- °1 tablespoon brown sugar, optional
- °salt to taste
- °pepper to taste
- °1/4 teaspoon smoked paprika



In same pan, adding onions also cook to translucent.

Add cabbage, salt, pepper and paprika and mix everything together. Cooking for 7 min or to cabbage is tender.

Add the bacon back to the pan and mix it with the cabbage and serve warm.
