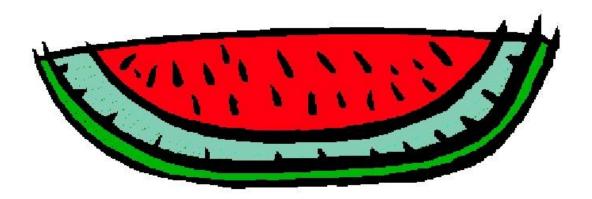
President's Message

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Date: July 20, 2023

Vice President Susan Holt called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

(Secretary's Note: August General Meeting will be on **August 10th at 7:00 p.m**. instead of August 17th, the first day of the Quilt Show; Board Meeting being held at 6:00 p.m.)

Sunshine & Shadows: Jackie Wagner started off the meeting with Shadows. Sue Gray is not doing well. She has kidney problems and cancer of the lungs which has spread to other body parts. Carol Cook read a note from Sue. Cards would be appreciated. Alene Winn is doing very well. Her doctor told her that she does not need any more surgeries. She had been suffering with a leg infection.

Birthdays: Everyone sang "happy birthday" to Susan Holt, Sue Gray, Nan Coleman, and Alison Dale.

New Members and Guests: There were two guests—Yvonne Steelman—a friend of Gayle Henegar, and Beverly Ingram, the guest speaker.

July Program: Beverly Ingram from Quilter's Dream quilt shop presented a light-hearted trunk show of some of the many quilts that she has created, interspersed with lessons and tips she has learned along the quilt making journey.

Board and General Meeting Minutes: After the break, Ernestine Chipman started off the Business Meeting asking for any corrections to the May Board Meeting or May General Meeting minutes and then the same minutes for June. One correction was requested for the May General Meeting minutes which will be made before Ernestine does the July Meeting minutes write up. Both the May and June Board and General Meeting Minutes were unanimously approved, with the May General Meeting correction.

25th Anniversary Museum Exhibit: Ernestine then updated the membership regarding the Irving Archives & Museum exhibit for the Guild. The Museum staff is busily doing the layout for the exhibit. They like both ideas for exhibit activities—the table demonstrating block making and the Friendship groups meeting in the Museum's 3D Lab. The exhibit will need volunteers to function as docents. There were several questions which Ernestine will get answered as soon as she can. Another article in this newsletter provides more details on these activities and docents.

Quilt Show: *Tickets*: Carol Cook announced that she has additional \$12 tickets that she is selling at this meeting. *Show Times*: 10 a.m.-5:30 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, August 17th & 18th; Saturday, August 19th, 10:00 a.m.- 5:00 p.m. *Delivery Date and Time*: Quilt Show quilts need to be delivered to the Irving Convention Center sometime between 12-4 p.m. on Sunday, August 13th. Submission requirements: The quilts should include: 1) A covered label on each submitted quilt; 2) A sleeve on the top of the quilt; and 3) Name, address, and phone number of the person on each quilt submission. Quilt Pick-up: Entered quilts can be picked up starting at 5 p.m. on Saturday. There will be a fine of \$10/day for any not picked up. *Volunteers*: The Expo still has 100 volunteer positions open. You can sign up on the Expo's website. Sign-up Genius is available for those members wanting to volunteer. Classes: There are still openings. Check the schedule on the Expo's website.

Quilt Show Booth: Shawn Carr thanked everyone who has made items for the Booth. She has lots of gifts that have been made for the Booth. She needs 2 volunteers to set up the booth on Wednesday, the 16th. During the Show, she only needs volunteers during the lunch hours on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. She and Ginny North are going to price all the items this weekend.

25th Anniversary Luncheon: Will be held on Saturday, September 23rd, from 1:30-3:00 p.m. at Villa's Grill Brazilian steakhouse on Main Street. All the food will be brought to the table. This will only be a social event; no speaker. Invitations will be coming in the mail.

Fall 2023 Retreat: Ginny North announced that she is collecting money at this meeting and the August meeting for the Fall Retreat, being held at Red Boot from October 12-15th. Total cost is \$300 for the 3 days. She will not be able to collect any money beyond the August meeting because of the new 30-day, in advance payment policy of the facility. The facility requires a minimum of 25 sign-ups. Fourteen members have signed up. If enough people do not sign up, Ginny will reach out to non-members. Massages will also be available if enough people sign up. Ginny will accept checks mailed to her.

July Workshop: Susan Holt announced that the July 22nd Workshop, teaching painting on fabric, has been cancelled because the teacher, Deborah Kay, is ill.

Angel Quilts: Donna Reid announced that she has some additional dog and other fabric this month for the person winning the Angel Quilts drawing. Pam Chenault won the 4 red points drawing and the fabric.

Show and Tell: Several Butterfly quilts were shown, made with the pattern which was published in the July newsletter. One member showed her first Christmas-themed quilt which she quilted on her embroidery machine.

The meeting ended with door prizes being awarded.

Meeting called to order at 2:15 p.m. by Susan Holt, Vice President. It was a short meeting because there was not a quorum to vote on anything new.

Finance: Susan Holt passed around copies of Jerry Bowen's June Finance report. There were no questions. Then, Susan Holt went over the agenda for the June General Meeting. She asked each board member present if they had something to report. She made reports for those not present.

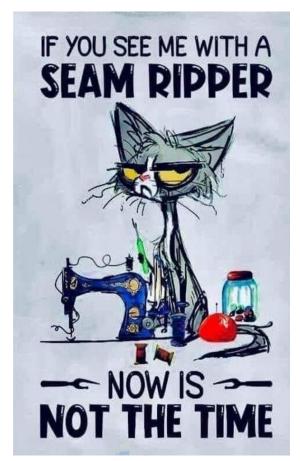

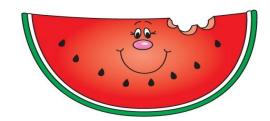

Watermelon Smoothie Recipe

Watermelon Smoothie is a refreshing change from the traditional watermelon mocktails and juices that you see around. It is simple, quick and super delicious. Children simply love this smoothie, as red in color and feels wholesome and refreshing, providing instant energy after playing in the intense summer heat. The addition of rose water to the watermelon smoothie adds to the taste and flavor of this smoothie.

Ingredients

2 cups Watermelon, deseeded, cut into cubes 1-1/2 cups Milk 1 teaspoon Rose water Honey, to taste Ice cubes, to serve



How to make Watermelon Smoothie Recipe

To make the Watermelon Smoothie Recipe, add all the ingredients into a blender and blend until smooth and creamy.

Add the milk a little at a time while blending so the melons get ground well into a smooth puree. Serve chilled.

Apple pie pudding

8 cups bread cubes

3 medium apples, peeled, seeded and chopped

4 eggs

1 cup vanilla yogurt

1 cup milk

2 teaspoons cinnamon, divided

½ teaspoon nutmeg

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c sugar + 2 tablespoons

Half a cup of raisin sauce

1 c unsalted butter

1 c heavy cream

1 c brown sugar



directions:

Preheat oven 350 degrees.

Spray a 9×13 baking dish with cooking spray.

In a large bowl, whisk together milk, buttermilk, eggs, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, nutmeg, and 1/2 cup sugar.

Add the apples and raisins, then gently add the bread cubes. Pour into the prepared skillet.

In a small bowl, stir in 2 tablespoons sugar and 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Sprinkle over bread pudding. Baking for 30-40 min

While the bread pudding is baking, make the caramel sauce.

In a heavy saucepan over medium-low heat, mix together the butter, heavy cream, and brown sugar. Brings to a boil.

Reduce the heat and simmer until the sauce thickens, 5 minutes. Pour over bread pudding to serve.

Put vanilla ice cream on top.

- * If you can leave the bread cubes outside for a few hours until they are nice and dry. If not, place on a baking sheet and bake at 350 for 10-15 minutes or until dry but not toasted.
- *You can make it the night before and pop it in the oven for breakfast in fact it gets better if it stays all night!

There were 15 beautiful Angel Quilts collected in July. This brings the total delivered to Scottish Rite to 138. Thank you everyone! We have until the November meeting to earn points and reach our

300-quilt goal. August is a busy month for everyone volunteering for the show but try to set aside time to finish your Angel Quilt.

Sarah proved to us you can make beautiful quilts utilizing free fabric.

Remember the small quilts are worth 4 points for piecing and 3 points to the quilter. If you do both you receive both. The size is a minimum of 90 inches. One length plus one width. The large quilt is worth 8 points for the piercer and 6 for the quilter. If you do both you earn both. The size is minimum 120".

The quilt must have the top, batting and backing. It must be quilted not tied. There cannot be any buttons or bows attached to the quilt because children receive them.

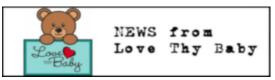

Use 100% quilting cotton.

This suggestion is one of those vital beginner quilting tips that I wish I had known when I first started. I know it's tempting to purchase cheaper fabrics that aren't 100% cotton, but unfortunately, they won't last as long as 100% quilting cotton will.

That said, you don't have to buy expensive "designer" fabrics to make something beautiful and long-lasting. Most fabric shops or your local arts and crafts stores (such as Hobby Lobby or Joanns) have a beautiful selection of fabrics that often go on sale.

PARMESAN-GARLIC-ROAST-POTATOES

Ingredients

2 pounds red potatoes cut into 1 inch pieces

2 Tablespoons olive oil

1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese

3 garlic cloves minced

1/2 teaspoon oregano

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

chopped parsley for garnish

Instructions

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Lightly spray a baking sheet with non stick cooking spray.

In a large bowl add the olive oil, parmesan cheese, garlic, and oregano. Toss with the potatoes until coated and lay in a single layer on your baking sheet. Salt and pepper to taste. I also like to sprinkle additional parmesan on top.

Roast for 30-35 minutes or until golden brown and crisp. Serve with parsley sprinkled on top.

Prevent shadows.

To avoid shadowing when working with high-contrast fabrics, such as red and white, press the fabric seam toward the darker fabric or press seams open. "I prefer pressing seams open," says Linda. "It takes a little more time and attention, but the results are definitely worth it."

"When working with highcontrast fabrics, the back of the quilt top is just as important as the front," says Linda. She recommends clipping and removing loose threads because "darker stray threads will shadow through the lighter fabric once the quilt is quilted."
