GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Date: August 10, 2023

Vice President Susan Holt called the meeting to order at 6:55 p.m.

The General Meeting was held on the second Thursday in August because the Quilt Show starts on August 17th, its normal meeting time.

Program: The guest speaker, Dwayne Kelly, Tarrant County College Police Training Coordinator, started off the meeting. He provided some very important tidbits and tips for keeping safe in any situation. It comes down to being continually aware of your surroundings at all times. If you find yourself in a situation, slow down, say something/tell someone, stay where people are (in large places). He encouraged the attendees to use what they have on them or around them to distract the aggressor, to get the opportunity to get away, even using their hands.

Sunshine & Shadows: Jackie Wagner started off the business meeting with Shadows. She asked for a moment of silence for Sue Gray, a former Guild president and longtime member, who passed away on July 26th. There will not be a Texas service. Her daughter will be taking her to Oklahoma to be buried with her parents. For Sunshine, all were delighted to see Alene Winn in attendance with her husband, Miller. She stayed for a little bit to visit. She still has a long road of recovery but is doing well. Susan Holt read a note of thanks from her later in this meeting, for all the cards, phone calls and texts. Other notes of Sunshine: 1) Jackie's brother is coming from England to visit and her sister-in-law's lung cancer is completely gone; 2) Shawn Carr's son is getting married on August 27th; and 3) Jerry Bowen is a great grandmother for the first time.

Birthdays: Everyone sang "happy birthday" to Rachel Brown, Judy Poole, Carol Cook, Wanda Rolf, and Sarah Schacht.

New Members and Guests: There were three guests—Millard Winn, Alene's husband; Michelle Quarton, and Evelyn Moore.

Board and General Meeting Minutes: Ernestine Chipman asked for any corrections to the July Board Meeting or July General Meeting. Both the July Board and General Meeting Minutes were unanimously approved, as published in the August newsletter.

25th Anniversary Museum Exhibit: Ernestine then updated the membership regarding the Irving Archives & Museum exhibit for the Guild, providing answers for questions that had been asked during the July meeting. The answers and other updates are contained in a more detailed article later in this newsletter.

Quilt Show: Carol Cook reminded everyone that Show quilts need to be delivered to the Irving Convention Center sometime between *12-4 p.m. on Sunday, August 13th*. **Submission requirements:** The quilts should, each, be in a pillowcase and include: 1) a covered label on each submitted quilt; 2) a sleeve on the *top* of the quilt; and 3) name, address, and phone number of the person on each quilt submission. **Quilt Pick-up:** Entered quilts can be picked up starting at 5 p.m. on Saturday. There will be a fine of \$10/day for any not picked up. She still has \$12 tickets that she will only sell tonight.

Quilt Show Booth: Shawn Carr announced that she will setting up the Booth on Wednesday, the 16th. She has priced 800 items. Cash and credit will be accepted. She needs some volunteers for Friday and Saturday lunch relief. There will be a raffle basket with the theme around planning a trip in Texas. All the items are donated. Tickets are \$1/each, 6 for \$5. Drawing will be Saturday at 4 p.m. You don't need to be present.

25th Anniversary Luncheon: Shawn handed out invitations for the luncheon to meeting attendees. She will mail the rest. **Please RSVP to Hospitality Chair, Gayle Henegar, before Labor Day.**

Brown Sugar Caramel Pound Cake

Ingredients:

1 ½ cups butter softened
2 cups light brown sugar, packed
1 cup granulated sugar
5 large eggs
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
1 cup whole milk
1 8oz bag toffee chips (I use Heath)
1 cup pecans, chopped

Caramel Drizzle:

1 – 14 oz can sweetened condensed milk
1 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons butter
½ teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions:

Preheat oven to 325 spray a 12 cup Bundt pan with cooking spray or grease and dust with flour
Beat butter until creamy. Add sugars beating until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time. In medium bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt. Add flour mix to batter alternately with milk, beat until just combined. Stir in toffee chips and pecans. Spoon batter into pan and bake 85 minutes or until wooden pick comes out clean. To prevent excess browning, cover cake with foil while baking.
Let cake cool in pan for 10 minutes. Remove from pan, and let cool completely on a wire rack. Spoon caramel drizzle over cooled cake.

Directions for Caramel Drizzle

In a medium saucepan combine condensed milk and brown sugar; bring to a boil over medium-high heat, whisking frequently. Reduce heat, and SIMMER for 8 minutes, whisking frequently. Remove from heat; whisk in butter and vanilla. Let cool for 5 minutes before using. NOTE: Make sure to drizzle the caramel while it's still HOT

3 tbsps of flour.
A pinch of salt.
1 stick of butter.
1 tsp of vanilla.

Method:

In a large bowl, mix all the ingredients together until blended then pour the mixture in an unbaked 9 inch pie shell.

Sprinkle the top with some nutmeg then bake for 15 minutes in a preheated oven to 400 degrees. Reduce the temperature to 350 degrees and bake for an additional 45 minutes.

Hello Red Boot Retreaters,

I know many of you have been to this retreat center before, but below are just a few reminders:

There is a refrigerator and icemaker furnished, along with continental breakfast. Coffee and Tea are also supplied but any other food or refreshment is up to you.

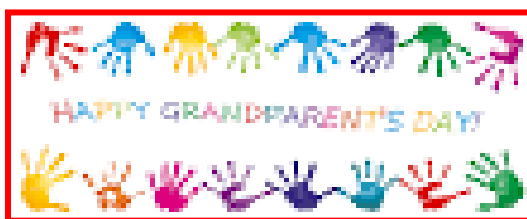

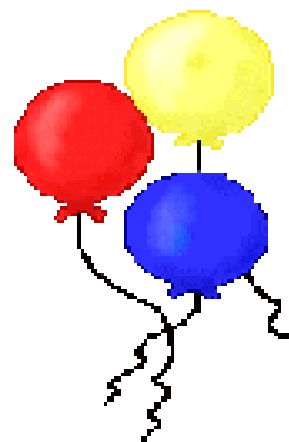
