IRVING QUILT GUILD GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Date: September 21, 2023

Acting President Susan Holt called the meeting to order at 6:55 p.m.

Quilt Show Results: Susan started off the meeting by recognizing all members who were involved in making the Guild's Quilt Show a success. Susan handed out gift bags to each of the Show Committee members. Jerry Bowen shared the financial results: Overall the Guild made about \$5700 from the Show, a little over \$3500 of this from the Quilt Show Booth, \$155 from Guild T-shirt sales, and about \$900 on ticket sales.

Shawn Carr, Quilt Show Booth Chair, also told attendees that the Irving Archives and Museum staff, 5 of whom attended the Quilt Show, purchased \$200 of the Quilt Show Booth items that did not sell and have already sold \$100 of that purchase. Some items include bookmarks, eyeglass cases, and structured bowls. She had anyone who did anything for the Booth to stand up and be recognized.

Program: Linda Cole and Cynthia Gladden followed the results by presenting an "Ideas and Gadgets" program at 2 round tables. Attendees spent 15 minutes at each table, learning binding tips from Linda and about new gadgets and tools from Cynthia. Afterwards, attendees enjoyed cupcakes and candies provided by the Guild and Gayle Henegar to celebrate the Show's success and Barbara Martin's 95th birthday.

Other Special Recognition: Gail Wilson recognized Ernestine Chipman for receiving a City of Irving's High-Spirited Citizen Award for her volunteer work in the community.

Galla Award: This award is given to a member whose Quilt Show entry is voted the best by the Guild members. This award honors the Guild's founding member, JoLynn Galla, who remains an inspiration to everyone in the Guild. Jerry Bowen won the award for her patriotic-themed quilt, "O Say Can You Sew".

Sunshine & Shadows: <u>Sunshine</u>: Jackie Wagner is absent because her brother is visiting from England, whom she has not seen in 4 years. <u>Shadows</u>: Carol Cook's brother died of cancer, right near the end of the Quilt Show. Connie Angeles had to miss this meeting because she is being treated for mouth ulcers.

New Members and Guests: There were no new members or guests at the meeting.

Board and General Meeting Minutes: Ernestine Chipman asked for any corrections to the minutes for the August General Meeting. The August General Meeting Minutes were unanimously approved by voice vote, as published in the September newsletter.

25th Anniversary Museum Exhibit: Ernestine then updated the membership regarding the Irving Archives & Museum exhibit for the Guild, the details of which are contained in an article published further in this newsletter.

25th Anniversary Luncheon: Shawn reminded everyone about the special luncheon being held at The Villas on Main Street at 1:30 p.m., Saturday, the 23rd, on the corner of Main Street, next to the chiropractor. There will be a few door prizes and a cake for dessert. Come hungry and wear whatever clothes are comfortable for you.

Irving Volunteer Fair and new Guild business cards: Suzanna Fox announced that the Irving Arts Center is having a volunteer organization fair. She will be staffing the Guild's table and invites anyone to help her. This table will have some of the new business cards. Please be sure to toss your old business cards.

Fall 2023 Retreat: Ginny North announced that she has 24 people signed up for the Fall Retreat. There will be door prizes and attendees will be playing a special game. The brown bag exchange items must be quilt-related, handmade, or purchased at a cost no more than \$15.

September Workshop: No workshop because of the Anniversary Luncheon.

October Meeting and Program: The election will be held at the October meeting. The program will be, "Pumpkins at the Guild". Attendees should bring a pumpkin-themed item which will be put in a brown bag for a drawing.

October Workshop: Janie Merritt and Kristi Nelson showed the appliqued quilt, "Abby's Elephant Party", that they will be teaching at the workshop, "Machine or Hand Applique", on October 21st at the Holy Family Catholic Church's cafeteria. Ingredients:

Water 9-10 cups ¹/₂ cup chopped onion 1 cup pearl barley large bay leaf 1 1 pound roast, cut into small pieces 1 and a half cups of carrots Celery, chopped 1 and a half cups 8 ounces sliced mushrooms



Beef Base 2 Tbsp You can also use beef broth here, but the beef base works wonders and I only need to use 2 Tbsp for this recipe Methods :

We take a frying pan and cook the meat to your taste as the cooking you like.

When the beef is ready, add it to the slow cooker. Add carrots, water, bay leaf, onion, celery, mush-rooms, and meat base.

Cook over high heat, then add barley. Season with salt and pepper to taste and cook until beef and vegetables are tender to your requirements.

Remove the bay leaves and serve in a plate with fish crackers, chili sauce, soy sauce and lemon.

Misty's Book Nook



Title: Out of Nowhere (2023) Author: Sandra Brown Genre: Romantic Thriller Adult content/ spice warning but not 50 shades level

At a Texas county fair, amidst carousels and a bustling midway, children's book author Elle Portman is enjoying a rare night out with her favorite cowboy: her two-year-old son, Charlie. But just as they're about to head home, the unthinkable happens: a shooter opens fire into the crowd, causing widespread panic to erupt all around them.

Also caught in the melee was corporate consultant Calder Hudson. Arrogant, self-centered, and high off his latest career win, he's frustrated and confused when he wakes up in the hospital after undergoing emergency surgery on his arm. The doctor tells him that he was lucky—that as far as gunshot wounds go, he pulled through remarkably well. Others weren't so lucky, which instills in Calder a furious determination to get justice . . . a goal shared by Elle.

Their chance encounter at the police station leads to a surprising and inexplicable gravitation to one another, but even as the attraction grows, Elle and Calder can't help but wonder if the unimaginable tragedy that brought them together is too painful and too complicated to sustain—especially while the shooter remains at large.

French Onion Soup Casserole

6-large onions sliced thin
2-quarts of beef stock
6-tbs of butter
1/2-tsp dry rosemary
1/2-cup of dry red wine
1-tbs worcestershire
French bread sliced 1/2 thick toasted
1-lb. Gruyere cheese shredded
salt
black cracked pepper
oven proof casserole

melt the butter in a large pot

add all the onions fold to coat with the butter, season with salt on a low heat caramelize the onions folding them over and over along the way. They should be cooked down to a

deep golden.

add the wine scrape all the brown bits off the bottom of the pot.

add the stock and the Worcestershire sauce

simmer covered for 30 minutes

fill the casserole with the soup.

float a layer of the toasted bread, top with mounds of the cheese, more is better

place in a 350 degree pre heated oven until the cheese is melted and golden.

The key to this recipe is in the caramelizing of the onions. You'll want to take your time cooking them down and allow them to become deep golden. That is where a lot of the flavor comes from. Use a ladle and serve in soup bowls.
