IRVING QUILT GUILD GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Acting President Susan Holt called the meeting to order at 6:55 p.m.

Date: November 16, 2023

December Christmas Celebration and Food & Recipe Partners: There was one activity before the meeting started. Gayle Henegar, Hospitality Chair, passed out a basket of Christmas-themed paper puzzle pieces. All members in attendance were asked to pick one puzzle piece and then find the matching piece from another member, at the meeting's Break. Both members with the matching pieces will decide who will cook and what to cook—dessert, salad, or side dish. Then they will sign the appropriate item's sign-in sheet. The "cook" will send the recipe to their partner and that person will print out the recipe to pair with the cooked item, enough copies for all members. There are 5 sets of puzzle pieces for which those partners will provide tablecloths and napkins. The Guild will provide the meat.

In connection with the December celebration, Donna Reid announced that the celebration will be held *December 14th*, not December 21st because it is too close to Christmas. It will be in the Church's Cafeteria. She asks that, when you arrive, please use the door that leads directly to the outside, not the hallway and go through the fence. Mass will be in progress with Adoration following it and complete quiet is needed.

Susan Holt also announced 2 other activities for the December celebration—a game, Left-Right-Center, but no fabric required; and a Christmas treat exchange for those who would like to bring something. The winner of the game will get to select one of the Door Prizes. The Christmas treat can include a sack of anything that you want—cookies, candy, candles, etc.--but something not costing more than \$10.

Then Acting President Susan Holt officially called the meeting to order at 6:55 p.m.

Blue Christmas: The main November meeting program was to hand over to the firemen the many unwrapped gifts and checks that members brought to this meeting for the Blue Christmas project. The Guild's Board also voted to donate \$100 to Blue Christmas. Benny Renaud from Station 6 was the representative for the Irving firemen because the Station 6 firemen were not able to attend because they got tied up with something else at the last minute. The firemen will not know until after the first week in December how many families they will be serving or the date yet for when the toys and other gifts will be sorted. Benny will let Evelyn Banks know.

A break followed during which members found their Food & Recipe partner and signed up for either dessert, salad, or side dish.

General Meeting Minutes: The Business side of the meeting started with Ernestine Chipman asking for any corrections to the minutes for the October General Meeting. Those minutes were unanimously approved by voice vote, as published in the November newsletter.

25th Anniversary Museum Exhibit: Ernestine then updated the membership on the Irving Archives & Museum exhibit (see article published further in this newsletter).

48-Hour Workshop: Ginny North announced that it will be held on January 20th. RSVPs will be required because lunch will be provided. Ginny showed the pattern for a lap size quilt which will be taught by Beverly Ingram. Beverly will be bringing a sample to the December meeting. Donna Reid and Ginny are working on the location.

Spring 2024 Retreat: Ginny reminded everyone that the Spring 2024 retreat will be held April 4-7, 2024, at Sunset. It is \$270 for the 3 nights. She will start collecting money at the December meeting. The last month that she can accept payment is February.

Membership: There were no new members or guests at the meeting. Suzanna is collecting 2024 dues in November and December--\$30/year. Cash or check accepted. No new application is needed unless there are changes.

Angel Quilts: Donna Reid thanked everyone who has made an angel quilt this year. The total number turned in so far is 222 quilts. Three hundred is the goal. Donna Reid awarded 4 points and some fabric to Susan Holt.

She also reported that the items in the blue bags that were donated to Blue Christmas are blankets that several Guild Friendship groups have worked on. She also has donated some to the Unshackled Soldiers charity, https://uscministries.org/.

IRVING QUILT GUILD GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Nominations Committee: Chairperson, Judy Poole, needs someone to be First VP, responsible for Programs and Workshops. Donna Reid was volunteered.

Patriotic Quilts: Carol Cook announced that she has 4 kits ready to be made for the veterans' picnic in May. She needs the quilts made, and turned in, by April.

Keeper Quilts: Pam Chenault, the new Committee chairperson, reminded everyone to think about making Keeper Quilts. The Guild has donated all of its stash. Carol Cook has offered to bring one to a meeting.

Show and Tell and Door prizes closed out the meeting.

The Acting President adjourned the meeting at 7:55 p.m.

**QUILT EXHIBIT AT THE IRVING ARCHIVES AND MUSEUM UPDATE **



The November 11th Guild activity, from 1-3 p.m. in the Spark Lab, was a success. The Cut-ups Friendship Group demonstrated how to start a quilt. There was a large group of ladies from Jerry Bowen's yoga class who enjoyed the activity. Ernestine received positive comments from several class members. There was also a 10-year-old in the Lab at the same time who came over and briefly watched Pansy Shehee sew on some borders. She told Pansy that she was interested in learning to quilt.

<u>Upcoming activities</u>: The next Guild Exhibit activity will be on Saturday, <u>December 9th</u>, <u>from 1-4 p.m</u> in the Museum's SparkLab. The Threadpickers Friendship Group will make quilted hearts to support the international campaign, "<u>I Found A Quilted Heart</u>". This is a FREE SATURDAY so please come and support this group.

Other activities: Sunday, November 26th, 12-4 p.m., Come-n-Go event for Bowie Middle School: This is a FREE EVENT to which the Guild is invited. Suzanna and Ernestine plan to attend and possibly hand out Family Funday placemats and puzzles which will contain the Guild's business card. Thursday, December 7th Middle School Tour (Time TBD) by 17 fourth graders.

Smoke Sausage And Cheesy Potato Casserole

1 package shredded hash browns 26 ounce bag

1 cup sour cream

10.5 ounce cream of mushroom soup

3 cups shredded cheddar cheese divided

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon salt optional

1 pound smoked sausage sliced

Pour hashbrowns into a large mixing bowl.

Spread sour cream and cream of mushroom soup over hashbrowns. Season with salt and pepper by sprinkling over the top. Stir well.

Add 2 cups of cheddar cheese and stir well.

Spread in the bottom of greased 9 x 13 baking pan. Bake for 35 minutes at 350°F

The Lite Red raffle points were won by Nancy Norris. She also won a box of Crayola color fat quarters to get her on her way to another quilt.





Mexican Restaurant Cheese Dip

1 pound white, deli-sliced American cheese ²/₃ cup of milk or half-and-half

3-4 tablespoons of canned, chopped green chiles or jalapenos.

1 teaspoon cumin

1 teaspoon chipotle powder (optional)

If using a slow cooker, turn on to the lowest setting. Dump everything in, heat and stir until thickened.

Adrian Rizzo was seven when she met her father for the first time. That was the day he nearly killed her—before her mother, Lina, stepped in.

Soon after, Adrian was dropped off at her grandparents' house in Maryland, where she spent a long summer drinking lemonade, playing with dogs, making a new best friend—and developing the stirrings of a crush on her friend's ten-year-old brother. Lina, meanwhile, traveled the country promoting her fitness brand and turning it into a billion-dollar business. There was no point in dwelling on the past.

A decade later, Adrian has created her own line of yoga and workout videos, following in Lina's footsteps but intent on maintaining creative control. And she's just as cool-headed and ambitious as her mother. They aren't close, but they're cordial—as long as neither crosses the other.

But while Lina dismisses the death threats that Adrian starts getting as a routine part of her daughter's growing celebrity, Adrian can't help but find the vicious rhymes unsettling. Year after year, they keep arriving—the postmarks changing, but the menacing tone the same. They continue after she returns to Maryland and becomes reacquainted with Raylan, her childhood crush, all grown up and as gorgeously green-eyed as ever. Best Homemade Potato Soup

6 medium Russet potatoes, cut into bite size pieces

1 onion diced

3 carrots, peeled and sliced

3 stalks celery, diced

6 slices of bacon, cooked and crumbled

8 cups of vegetable broth or chicken broth

1 cup milk

½ cup heavy cream

1 tsp minced parsley

Salt and pepper to taste

3 tbsp flour (corn starch can be substituted)

1 cup finely grated cheese of your choice

How To Make Best Homemade Potato Soup

Add the bacon to a soup pot and cook until the fat is crispy. Remove from the pan and set aside. Pour off most of the bacon fat, but do not clean the pan. Return the pan to medium heat and add in the onion, celery and carrot

Stir and cook for two minutes, then add in the diced potatoes, salt, pepper and any other seasonings you like

Pour in the broth and bring to a low boil Cook for 10 minutes or until the potatoes start to soften. Whisk the

flour and the milk, add to the pot and stir continuously. Cook for another 5 minutes

Carefully scoop out ¼ to ½ of the soup and process it in a blender or food processor until it is smooth Add this back into the pot slowly and carefully so it does not splash back on you and burn

Stir in the crumbled bacon, leaving some for a garnish

Serve in bowls with parsley, bacon and a little cheese for a garnish


