IRVING QUILT GUILD GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Date: October 17, 2024 - Shawn Carr called the meeting to order at 6:50 p.m.

Sunshine and Shadows: Sunshine: Jackie Wagner announced that the kittens are doing well. She had no Shadows, but others did. Donna Reid's mother-in-law passed away recently. Jerry Tollett's memorial is Saturday, October 26th, at Holy Family Catholic Church, at 12 p.m. Another Sunshine announced by a member: her niece was diagnosed with lymphoma after giving birth. She had chemo soon after and a recent scan showed she is now cancer free.

October Birthdays: Everyone sang "Happy Birthday" to Donna Reid, Jill Hudgens, Lori Vauble, Deborah Kay, and Judy Doggett. **Guests and New Members:** None

September General Meeting Minutes: Ernestine Chipman asked for any additions or corrections to the General Meeting Minutes for September as published in the October newsletter. No additions or changes were requested. The Minutes were approved unanimously.

Galla Award: Everyone applauded Susan Turk who won this award for a quilt made in all pinks, slide #20 as part of the list of slides that was emailed to all members recently.

October Program and Workshop Bonnie Sloan provided a program on coloring fabric with colored pencils. passed out 5" inch fabric squares and a box of colored pencils along with several copies of the flower pattern to be traced on the fabric. Participants enjoyed the activity. She will also host a workshop at Holy Family for \$10 on Saturday, Oct. 19th, using a pattern to create a specific item using colored pencils.

November Program: Evelyn Banks provided information on the Blue Christmas program. John Ringhauser with the Irving Fire Department and some of the crew will be at this meeting to collect our donated items. The November newsletter will contain a list of desired items. She stressed that the items be new, not used, and not wrapped. They especially need items for teens. Members may also donate money—make check out to "Blue Christmas"—and non-perishable food.

Membership Dues: Shawn announced that Suzanna Fox and Elizabeth will be collecting 2025 membership dues during November and December. Members will not have to fill out a new form but should check and make certain that their information is current. Only cash or check is accepted.

Barbara Martin Announcement: Barbara's granddaughter, Stephanie Carmack, announced that Barbara's wish was for any Guild member to have anything they want in her sewing room—fabric, notions, machines, and etc. Stephanie will let us know when Barbara's sewing room will be ready for member visits.

48-Hour Quilting Class and May Picnic: Carol Cook brought a sample of the guilt that will be made during the 48-Hour class on the 3rd Saturday in January. It uses a flip-and-sew technique. The quilt requires three quarters of a yard of fabric in 5 different colors. Carol will hand out a sheet for cutting the fabric. Members have 1 more month to turn in donation quilts. She announced that she has 10 patriotic quilts so far for the May picnic. This year is a big anniversary for the event. Her goal is to collect 20 to 25 quilts.

Two Other Announcements: Shawn asked for help on the following activities:1) Teaching junior high students how to sew a specific item which will be donated to a children's home, specifically blankets out of fleece; and 2) needs a small space, maybe in a garage or shed or extra closet, that could be used to store all the Show Booth items. Re #1, Shawn has purchased 8 blankets which need to be cut into 5" x 1" thick strips; activity is scheduled for the 2nd week in December. Re #2: Donna is going to ask Holy Family; Plymouth Park will also be asked. Another member may have room in her shed. Contact Shawn for further details on both requests.

Show and Tell: Donna Reid awarded 4 points to Cynthia Gladden along with a Mickey Mouse panel.

Door Prizes ended the meeting. Meeting adjourned at 8:07 p.m.

Wash your hands. Clean hands are good for our fabric as well.



Would you consider doing some small quilts and or Receiving blanks for us? Love Thy Baby provides all the flannel to sew if your stash is short and you want volunteer hours, please consider doing small quilts or receiving blankets for us. *We provide all the flannel you need; all you have to do is surge or do a rolled hem on the 36 x 36 flannel.

*Small quilts 36 x 36 are completely put together all you have to do is do the quilting on top in the ditch, meandering or x's.

Please remember to bring all your Receiving Blankets, small quilts and hats back to our next meeting. Please make sure you return them in the white bag that you took them in along with the tag on the bag If you have any questions, please contact me. I thank you – and Love Thy Baby thanks you.

Flannel Receiving Blankets—50per bag 10 points.

Small Quilts—2 points per quilt

Keeper Quilts

The Keeper Quilt program provides donation quilts to charitable organizations in the DFW area which are used for their Fundraising. An organization requesting a Keeper Quilt must submit a written request **to the Board with at least 30 days advance notice.** If approved, the organization will be notified and asked to attend a regular guild meeting for a presentation of the quilt.

Keeper Quilt Requirements:

Once you have reached 24 volunteer points you are eligible to donate a Keeper Quilt. Keeper Quilt needs to be **SHOW QUALITY QUILTS**, no panel quilts will be accepted. There are three sizes of keeper quilts:

- 1. Bed Size Quilts Length plus width of finished quilt should total 175" or greater for a total of 24 points. If quilt is done by several people, the points will be split between them.
- 2. Lap Quilts Length plus width of finished quilt should total 120" to 174". Piecer gets 12 points and Quilter gets 12 points or money.
- 3. Wall Hanging Quilts-Length plus width of finished quilt should total 48" to 90", and must be custom quilted. Piecer gets 10 points and Quilter gets 10 points or money.

Please NO PANEL QUILTS. These quilts should NOT BE JUVENILLE Designs.

All quilts must have a sleeve for hanging, hand-sewn binding and machine/hand embroidery label with the following:

Irving Quilt Guild, Year made, Name of Pattern, Personal Information (optional) Thank you.

Patriotic Quilts

The Irving Quilt Guild proudly creates Show quality quilts to honor and comfort our physically and mentally wounded Service Men and Women, in all branches of the Military, both active duty and retired.

Volunteer Points for a finished Patriotic Quilt.

8 points for the Piecer

6 points for the Quilter (if you do both, you are entitled to both)

Requirements for making a Patriotic Quilt

Quilt store quality 100% cotton fabric. (Do not use sheets, thin, stiff or scratchy fabric.)

Wash your fabric before making your quilt. Use a Color Catcher in washing machine. (Do not use scented laundry products.)

Make a coordinating pillowcase, use a zippered bag or matching pillowcase in which to place your Quilt of Valor. (Do not send your quilt without a presentation case.)

A Label must be included with the following information: Irving Quilt Guild, Made by ?, and Quilted by ?. (Do not add political or religious messages.)

Size for TOP: Width 65" to 72" by Length 65" to 90".

Use straight cut or bias double fold for binding. (Do not fold over backing and use as binding.)

Machine or hand quilting in an appropriate design only. Free hand, pantograph, or computer guided patriotic or generic designs. Balanced stitches of uniform size, 8-12 stitches per inch. (Do not quilt as you go, stich in the ditch, tie, or do giant meandering.)

Use only Low-Loft quality batting. (Cotton 80/20, or poly from Pellon, Warm Company; Quilter's Dream; Hobbs)

Our Guild has done a great job over the years in making sure items for teenagers, both boys and girls, are supplied. Here are some more ideas:


- * ANYTHING for a teenage girl or boy.
